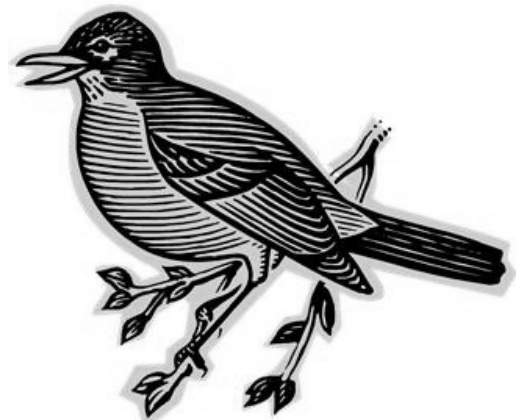

# Open Enrollment Lottery

March 1<sup>st</sup> through March 31<sup>st</sup> (Month of March)

Through the month of March individuals may stop by any of the school buildings or the Board of Education office to pick up open enrollment application (s). Once filled out, the application will need to be turned into the respective building. There will be no need to wait in a line as all open enrollment candidates are selected by the lottery system. Below is a detailed description of how the lottery system is to work.

## Lottery System

1. Fill out Open Enrollment application.
2. Return application to building of attendance or the Board of Education.
3. Applications will be sorted into grade levels.
4. Students that are current students or have siblings will be placed in separate piles as they are given precedence.
  - a. Number of students drawn from this pool will be based on the number of available seats per grade level.
5. On a given date, administration will then draw students from the pool of applications with no precedence (Current student and/or siblings).
  - a. Number of students drawn will be based on the number of available seats per grade level.
6. Students selected by open enrollment will be contacted by Central Office and/or Administration.
7. In the case that more spots are available than the number of applications, the open enrollment lottery process will reopen through the date of September 15<sup>th</sup>. This time period is often open due to the late registration of kindergarten students.

# Clearview Schools Dress Code

There has been a lot of talk about the Clearview dress code. I will attempt to clear up a few things. Oftentimes, the administration and teaching staff spend a portion of their day dealing with those who are inappropriately dressed for school. The administration is looking to develop uniformity across the district by implementing a dress code that revolves around SPIRIT WEAR. What does that mean? I am glad you asked. It involves wearing certain bottoms as determined by the administrative staff and a top that consists of Clearview logos, whether it is from Vincent, Durling, or CHS. If none of these tops are available, a particular type of top would have to be worn. As we've said before, Clearview is proud of its school and its accomplishments. Spirit wear will allow this sense of pride to be demonstrated on a daily basis. Other factors that are considered include safety, discipline, and anxieties that stem from peer pressure. Spirit wear still allows for our students to have their individual identity while being supportive of their school. It is our belief that with this visual uniformity, school pride will increase even more. In addition, cohesiveness, unity, and Clearview commitment to excellence will increase.

We understand that this is a hot topic in which some people are for and some against. We are not suggesting that this will permanently change nor fix everything; however, we, wholeheartedly believe that it will improve and increase a positive atmosphere throughout all of the Clearview Local Schools.



## Clearview Curriculum & Instruction

#### Waiver Days

The state of Ohio requires each district to schedule a minimum of 180 instructional days each year. Two of those days can be for conferences (students and staff get off November 27<sup>th</sup> & February 14<sup>th</sup> this year to make up for after-school conferences during the year) – which then leaves 178 instructional days.

In addition, the state provides each district with the ability to **request** up-to four (4) additional days for professional development. This year, Clearview applied for, and was granted, those four days: August 30<sup>th</sup>, December 2<sup>nd</sup>, February 7<sup>th</sup>, and May 12<sup>th</sup>.

As you may have noticed, the state of Ohio (and much of the United States, as well) is involved in a number of improvement initiatives targeting student achievement, teacher evaluation, new curriculum standards, and advanced instructional technology. Because Clearview has been involved with the *Race to the Top* program, we have received extra funding to create plans to surmount all of these new hurdles.

In order to meet these demands, it is necessary to bring the staff together on a regular basis to re-view, explain, discuss, and create. Teachers learn about the new Common Core Standards and have time to do planning in order to make them a major part of their lessons; they are able to view professional development videos around Blended Learning and hear from colleagues how this is being used right here at Clearview; they are able to discuss the district's new evaluation system, learn why certain new things are being done, and give input into future details; they attend sessions on writing lesson goals, lesson plans, and lesson assessments; and, they have time to meet with their colleagues to align instruction across grade-levels and content areas.

Over the last few years, Clearview has made important advances in student achievement due to its ability to work together for improvement. The Waiver Days that the Ohio Department of Education has granted us give us the opportunity to work, not just harder, but smarter as well.

#### What should I do if my child is having trouble learning in school?

**RTI Team:** Request for assistance. Go to your child's school, express your concerns, and determine interventions as a team. Each school at Clearview has a RTI (Response to Intervention) team that can meet with you to brainstorm ideas on how to help your child be successful.

**Attendance:** Make sure your child is attending school every day. Poor attendance has a severe impact on student success.

**Grades:** Periodically, check your child's grades on PowerSchool in order to stay informed on academic progress.



**Organize:** Talk to your child about a system that would work best to organize him/her. This system is something that should be individual. Ideas? Use of Trapper Keeper. Use of an agenda to write down assignments. Think about ideas with your child on how to best organize him/her.

**Communicate:** Call or email your child's teachers to discuss progress. We need to work as a team to insure every student's success.

## 7th Grade Language Arts

On December 6, 2013, My 7<sup>th</sup> Grade Advanced Language Arts class participated in an event called Mock Trial at the Elyria Justice center. After reading the book *Nothing but the truth* By Avi and completing a variety of writing activities that align with the common core state standards, the students were given a case summary and witness statements about characters from the book. The standards include; improve critical thinking, reading, writing, public speaking and listening skills, develop understanding and appreciation for the law, court procedures, and the judicial system, understand constitutional rights and responsibilities, and recognize and reward students' academic and intellectual achievements. The main character of the book, Phillip Malloy was being accused of being a Chronic Truant, Juvenile Delinquent, and an Unruly Child. The students spent a few weeks learning about the Law, the Trial Process, and Steps in a Trial. We had a lawyer come in as a guest speaker to help the students better understand what it is like to be in a courtroom and what effective questions are for direct and cross examinations. The students worked cooperatively in teams to write effective questions and statements to support their case. The students did an excellent job during the mock trial and I was very proud of the hard work they put in to make this trial a success. My regular education classes were so interested in what I was doing with my advanced class that they wanted to participate in the process as well. I decided to do the mock trial with these classes, but unfortunately they cannot go to the Justice Center, so we are turning our classroom into the courtroom. The Principals Edward Chavez, Noeleen Rothaker, and our Superintendent Jerome Davis have agreed to come in and participate as the Judges for this trial.

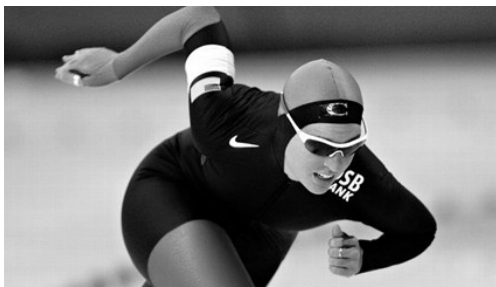
## What's Happening at Vincent Elementary?
