Well, once again we find ourselves half way through another school year here at Vincent Elementary School. Where does the time go?

The second part of the year is going to go just as fast as the first! We have some exciting events taking place here. In January, we have the Magical Theater Company set to perform "Larger Than Life: American Tall Tales." They will perform a rousing collection of some of the greatest American tall tales and legends such as Paul Bunyan, Pecos Bill, Johnny Appleseed, Annie Oakley, Wiley & the Hairy Man, among others. We also have COSI on Wheels making a stop. This event involves interactive science activities for our 3rd and 4th grade students.

As part of our SAIL program, the "Bowling Reward" is coming up in February. Students earn points daily to earn this reward. Some teachers track points using Class DOJO, while other teachers might have a checklist that they share with you. If students meet the monthly point requirement for January, they will go with their class to Rebman's Recreation Center to bowl. This is a fun day for our students and a great reward for their efforts in positive behaviors!

State Testing for 3rd and 4th Grade students will begin after Spring Break. Students will be tested in English, Language Arts and Math. The Third Grade English Language Arts test determines whether a 3rd Grade student moves to 4th Grade in the fall. If students do not meet the state requirements, they will be retained in 3rd Grade. Attendance is crucial during testing. Please make every effort to have your children in school during this time (and maybe plan your family vacations sometime after).

As I stated before, the second part of the year gets busy here at Vincent. If you are interested in helping out, please contact your child's teacher to see if there are volunteer opportunities in the classroom or in the building. Spring will be here before you know it.

VINCENT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL II

Mrs. Stambol's Fourth Grade ELA Class I often tie current events and newspaper reading into my ELA lessons. When I read about the new mural that would be finished in nearby Amherst to celebrate Veteran's Day, I thought my fourth grade ELA students would be interested in learning about the people it memorialized. I was particularly interested in the article because I had a cousin who would be portrayed on the wall. Last year, I began using a computer learning system called Google classroom which allowed me to send to The Morning Journal Article to each student for them to read, a google doc for them to type their informative essay on and a rubric to explain what is expected in an informative essay. Each student chose a different soldier from Lorain County that was portrayed in the mural and completed research on them before they began writing their essay. They found out what branch of the military they were in and where they served the country. Students were able to see that these brave soldiers crossed many familiar paths; such as local schools and sports teams. They also came to realize that they left behind families and young children like themselves. At the Vincent Elementary Veteran's breakfast, students read their essays to the Veterans that attended.









The Second Grade Team enjoyed an afternoon of creating balloon floats that were inspired by the popular book "Balloons Over Broadway" written by Melissa Sweet. The students read this book and completed many hands-on activities to learn the history of the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. The second graders also studied the life of Tony Sarg, the creator the of the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. They culminated this book study with a mini parade that included not only the second graders and their personalized balloon floats, but also members of the Clearview High School marching band. These high school students led the parade while the entire school lined the hallways to watch and enjoy the music and floats. This turned out to be a very popular event and will definitely be something the second graders will remember for years to come.

COSI ON WHEELS....

3rd and 4th graders from Vincent Elementary were given the opportunity to attend a COSI on Wheels in-house field trip on Thursday, January 25, 2018. This means students in those grades got to engage in an all day, hands-on event, allowing them to explore the "Incredible Human Machine" program. The students were able to use interactive science experiments to actively engage in their learning by participating in team building activities and stations. Students got to explore through the digestive system learning what foods are best for their bodies. They also exercised to help monitor their heat rate and pulse. Other stations allowed students to work with the nervous and circulatory systems.

COSI on Wheels is a traveling team of science experts from Columbus. Because of the distance, it is difficult for our students to travel there to enjoy this awesome experience. Having COSI come to our school meant students got to build a better understanding for science in a stimulating environment all while having fun! It was an amazing day, watching students interact with each other, doing activities and expanding their knowledge of the human body. OPEN ENROLLMENT LOTTERY - March 1-30, 2018

Individuals may pick up a form at the building of interest, the Board of Education Office or print from the Clearview Local Schools website (www.clearviewschools.org). Current open enrolled students must reapply each year. New open enrollment candidates are selected by a lottery system. Below is a detailed description of how the lottery system works:

- 1. Complete the Open Enrollment application
- 2. Return the application to the building of attendance or the Board of Education Office.
- 3. Applications will be sorted into grade levels.
- 4. Current open enrolled students and siblings will be placed into separate piles as they are given precedence. Siblings consist of those having the same residential/custodial parent(s).
- 5. On a given date (in April), the administration will then draw students from the pool of new applications with no precedence.
 - a. The number of students drawn will be based on the number of available seats per grade level.
- 6. <u>New</u> students <u>selected</u> by open enrollment will be contacted by the Clearview registrar and/or Administration (middle to end of May). <u>New</u> students <u>not selected</u> <u>will not</u> receive any notification. <u>Current</u> open enrolled students who will continue 2018-2019 school year will not receive new notification.
- 7. Parents of prospective students will have up to 10 days to accept the enrollment or the seat may be offered to other open enrolled applicants.
- 8. In the event that more spots are available than the number of applicants, the open enrollment process will reopen through September 15th. This time period is often open due to the late registration of kindergarten students.

Lastly, children sketched and then built new animal habitats.

Happy New Year Clearview Clippers! This school year has been full of exciting news regarding teaching and learning. For this article, I will focus on what's new at Vincent Elementary School. The teachers began using a Wilson Language program called "Fundations" with all students in grades K-2. This program provides research-based materials and strategies essential to a comprehensive reading, spelling, and handwriting program. Students in grades K-2 receive a systematic program in critical foundational skills, emphasizing:

* Phonemic awareness

* Phonics/ word study

* High frequency word study

* Reading fluency

* Vocabulary

* Comprehension strategies

* Handwriting

* Spelling

This instruction aligns with the state's rigorous college and career-ready standards. Although the "Fundations" program includes comprehension strategies, it must be combined with a core/literature-based language arts program for an integrated and comprehensive approach to reading and writing. For this, I have provided each classroom with ample materials and resources, and for the teachers at Vincent, the opportunity to develop and refine their skills in teaching English Language Arts. I have partnered with Scholastic to provide training and coaching throughout this school year. Effective teachers create strength-based, highquality literacy instruction that helps all students learn with purpose, proficiency, power, and joy.

Every day, comprehensive literacy teachers organize their instruction around a Gradual Release of Responsibility and whole group, small group, and independent practice as they work to:

* Strengthen Oral Language Skills

* Share Interactive Read-Alouds

* Practice Guided Reading

* Promote Independent Writing

* Promote Independent Reading

- * Engage Families and the Community
- * Integrate Reading and Writing
- * Encourage Purposeful Reading and Writing
- * Build Foundational Language Skills & Conventions

* Optimize Learning Supports as follows -

- a. by maximizing learning supports, fully integrating them into instruction and school management.
- b. by providing physical, social, emotional, and academic assistance that enables students to succeed at school.
- c. by providing responsive, personalized instruction that meets the needs of all learners.
- d. by promoting strong leadership that works to build a full continuum of essential schoolcommunity learning supports.
