Welcome back everyone and greetings to our new students and families.

With a warm and welcoming atmosphere, dedicated teachers, and a mix of cultures representative of our community, Vincent Elementary School (VES) is a wonderful place to teach and to learn.

Vincent Elementary is committed to academic excellence. Together with our families and the community, the staff and students work toward clearly focused educational, personal, and social goals. On behalf of the staff here at Vincent Elementary, we look forward to another successful year. Thank you for sharing your child with us and allowing us to be a part of their educational experience.

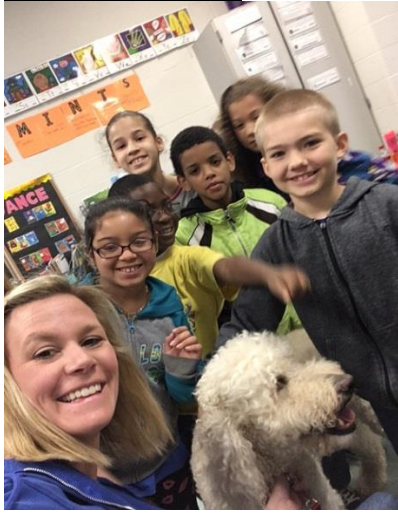

VINCENT CAR RIDER PICK UP

Blue Side (Office side) - You will now **PARK** your car in the parking lot and pick your child up in the cafeteria. You must have a blue pass or you will need to sign your child out. You will not be able to line up against the building because busses will now be traveling through this route. We need this route for busses and emergency vehicles.

Yellow Side (Fleming Side) - You **MUST** remain in your car and stay in the car line on Fleming Avenue. You cannot get out of your car to pick up your child. You must remain in the line and show the yellow pass. Please do not make U-turns on Fleming Avenue.

Car Rider Passes are for students who are picked up from school on a daily basis. Questions??? Contact our office at 233-7113.

Car Rider Passes are REQUIRED. They are plastic instead of paper. You must acquire a new pass prior to school starting.

Vaccine requirement for 7th and 12th Grade Entry

The Ohio Department of Health has immunization requirements for students entering 7th and 12th grades.

Students entering the 7th grade are required to receive the meningococcal vaccine to protect them from meningitis, as well as Tdap vaccine to protect them from tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis. Students entering 12th grade are required to receive the meningococcal vaccine.

Additionally, children can begin receiving vaccinations required to enter kindergarten any time after their 4th birthday.

You can get any of these vaccines from your medical provider or call the Lorain County General Health District at 440-284-3206 to schedule an appointment.

Wow what a year! To say that we are happy with the increased level of community and student involvement within CHS would be a gross understatement. Our Halloween walk doubled in attendance from the previous year even with the Indians clinching against Toronto the night of the walk. This coming fall, we hope to have a corn maze and even more displays for photo opportunities. We may have also heard a rumor about an appearance from the Great Pumpkin!

A new event which was a huge success was our first annual Fall Fest. Over 10 vendors were on site offering crafts and food for sale along with 15 carnival games designed and built by professionals from the gaming industry. Kids were able to buy game tickets and win tokens which were redeemable from a huge selection of age appropriate prizes.

This past year saw the seniors win the first annual Clipper Cup Challenge. Throughout the year, the four classes competed in spirit events to earn points towards the cup championship. Factors such as overall class GPA, class attendance, and discipline referrals also played a factor. The front runners for this year's cup appear to be the incoming Juniors. The competition kicks off in September with the first major events centered on homecoming. Good luck classes!

A new feature at CHS this coming year will be ISA (Intervention Support Assistance) three days a week. ISA will be assigned to those students struggling with behavior, attendance, and academic concerns. The goal of ISA is to give struggling students a chance to have direct contact with teachers and counselors in a mentoring environment in which they can receive support on a more personable level. Eight different staff members will be engaging students in the ISA room throughout the day, giving each an enhanced chance of connecting with a personality which most closely matches their own. The whole idea is to make a connection with kids and help them overcome the root causes of their struggles.

Finally, we are excited to announce the opening of our new media center. The library (which was dedicated in 1956) has been transformed and updated into a modern day technology center focused on utilizing the latest in student learning techniques, interactive classrooms, online research and project guidance, and student collaboration. The new space will include two separate class interaction zones, interactive TVs, mobile and desktop computers, interchangeable desks and tables, study kiosks, and comfortable social seating along with device charging stations. The new media center will be staffed full time by a media and technology specialist able to assist both students and staff in optimizing the center to its fullest potential. We hope to have everything up and running by the time students arrive in August, so please take advantage of our community events to come and check out these exciting changes!

Bus Rules/Regulations

The following rules and regulations insure the safest, most enjoyable and efficient transportation for your children.

1. Students must be at bus stop on time. Students should be at the bus stop at least 5 minutes before bus arrives. Bus operates on a fixed schedule.
2. While waiting at the bus stop, students must wait on sidewalk, driveway, or as far off of traveled portion of the road as possible.
3. Students must wait in an orderly manner and wait until bus comes to complete stop before approaching the bus.
4. If it is necessary to cross street or roadway, students must wait until driver signals them to cross and cross the street or roadway 10-15 feet in front of the bus to ensure that the driver sees them.
5. Students must enter bus single file and be seated as quickly as possible.
6. Upon leaving bus; wait until the bus comes to a complete stop before standing to exit. Standing is not permitted on a moving bus.
7. Exit single file in an orderly manner and walk away from the bus.
8. Upon leaving bus, if student must cross roadway, walk approximately 10-15 feet forward so the driver can see the student. Do not cross until driver signals you to do so.
9. The operator of any school bus shall be responsible for the order and conduct of the pupils transported.
10. The operator has the responsibility to assign seats and will be directed to do so as a matter of policy.
11. Pupils should obey promptly and willingly any reasonable directive of the driver.
12. Outside of ordinary conversation, classroom conduct is to be observed. Shouting, vulgar language or gestures are not permitted.
13. Pupils must remain seated with feet on the floor in front of them; not in the aisle or draped over the seat back. Students must sit facing forward while the bus is in motion as if they were wearing seatbelts.
14. Students may not board or depart from a bus at any other stop than that which has been properly authorized by school authorities.
15. Pupils will not extend hands, arms, heads or objects from the bus windows at any time.

16. Pupils are not permitted to shout, or gesture to passing vehicles or pedestrians from the bus.
17. Students may adjust windows only when permitted to do so by the driver.
18. Pupils may not throw any object including trash or paper either from within or out of the bus while waiting for, riding, or after leaving the bus. A trash can is provided.
19. Riders must stay out of the driver's seat and may not tamper with any operating equipment.
20. Students may not exit from the emergency door unless directed to do so by the driver.
21. Eating and drinking food and beverages on the bus is prohibited. Neither food nor liquids are permitted on the bus except in school lunch bags or lunch pails.
22. The use of tobacco, drugs or alcohol in any form shall not be permitted on the bus.
23. Animals, knives, matches, firearms including cap and water pistols, explosives, glass and other similar breakables, or any other items creating a safety hazard are not permitted on the bus. Necessary school books and backpacks are permitted. Other items are not permitted.
24. Students needing to ride any bus other than their regular assigned bus must give driver a note from their principal or parent.
25. Students desiring to take another student home with them who does not normally ride a particular bus must obtain prior permission from bus driver or authorization from their principal to assure the bus is not overloaded.
26. Absolute quiet is required at railroad crossings. The driver will turn off all radios and illuminate the dome lights to alert students to be absolutely quiet.

Transportation will be provided for:

All students in Kindergarten through 8th grade residing in the Clearview District who live one mile or more from the building of attendance, including Vincent and Durling.

Students attending the Lorain County JVS will be transported from Clearview High, departing at 6:35 AM and return to Clearview High at approximately 2:40 PM.

The pickup points and times printed on this schedule will be in effect for the opening of school. Routes are subject to change due to new enrollment or withdrawals of students and pickup - drop off locations may also be changed.

Times listed may vary by ten minutes for approximately two weeks after school starts.

Please remember when bad weather occurs the buses will leave 5 minutes early. This also includes the JVS bus.
Your understanding is appreciated.

Students are not authorized to change buses unless written approval from the building principal is obtained by the parent.
