## Message from the Superintendent of Schools

If you are reading this message, then you know that school will be starting soon. We will begin our 2014-2015 school year on August 18<sup>th</sup>. That will be the first day back with students and I am excited to see their bright smiles and bubbly personalities walking through the hallways of Vincent, Durling and CHS. I am equally excited to begin my second year as the superintendent of Clearview Local Schools. It makes me proud and happy to say that this past school year went very well and was one of the most remarkable years that I have had in education. There were a lot of new administrators that came aboard and helped to sail this clipper ship along the way; thus creating a very successful year.

We have a few new faces joining the administrative team. Penny Reinhart, former 4<sup>th</sup> grade teacher, will now be the district curriculum director and assistant administrator at Vincent Elementary School. Giles Brown III will be our new transportation supervisor. Both of these individuals have experience at Clearview and will be great additions to the administrative team.

This school year does bring about a few changes. The minimum number days will be replaced with a minimum number of hours, depending on the grade level. Those changes include:

½ day Kindergarten = 450 hours (<u>This does not affect CLS</u>) Full Day Kindergarten and grades 1-6 = 910 hours Grades 7-12 = 1001 hours

Note: These are the **minimum** number of hours that the district must meet. In addition, there are certain parts of the day that do not count as instructional time; therefore, cannot be included in the minimum number of hours (i.e., lunch periods, breakfast periods, after school activities, etc.). Clearview Local Schools, like many others, go above and beyond the minimum standards. Hence, we should not have a problem meeting the requirements as imposed by the Ohio Department of Education. However, keep in mind that if we have another bad winter, much like we did this past school year, we could be out of school for more days than we would like. If that becomes the case, we will have to take a look at the number of hours we missed and how many we need to make up in order to reach the minimum standards. In other words, counting snow days will not exist. The minimum number of hours must be

## **Clearview Highlights 2013-2014**

Our Science department continued to incorporate technology and hands on learning. Many students extracted DNA from strawberries and Halo bacterium for a visual learning experience to enhance their understanding of the structure and function of DNA, studied Newton's Law of Motions through rollercoaster design, made parachutes in Physical Science and used dissection to learn about anatomy. Much of the course work is available online for students to access any time. We offered one COPP science class, however this fall we will offer three science COPP classes through LCCC.

Our English department continued to use Turnitin.com as an opportunity for students to showcase their literary and writing skills as well as their technology skills. Seniors completed a senior project in which they interviewed someone in their prospective career field and put together a portfolio and presentation. Students expressed that they enjoyed completing the project and learned a lot of information to help them in their future endeavors.

Our Mathematics department added an extra math course, for the sole purpose of helping graduating seniors who struggled with Algebra 2; learn some upper level mathematics concepts. The class was a great success. The students, who normally struggled, learn new material and earned good grades. A focus on the OGT still was present in courses, which is demonstrated by the passage rate on the testing. The math department worked hard to ensure that high standards and student success is occurring in all classrooms. Collaboration between parents, teachers and tutors allowed student who had been unsuccessful in math classes for years to be successful and earn a math credit in classroom. The new Geometry books that were purchased allowed students to see many connections across math curriculum. It also showed connections throughout the entire Geometry curriculum and aligned to the new Common Core Standards.

Career Based Intervention is designed to give students the opportunity to complete their education while exploring the obligations of the world of work. We participated in the Lorain County Metro parks Holiday Lights again this year. Our students travelled to the park, set up the display for "The Polar Express," and then returned after the holiday to tear it down. In addition, we took a trip to Columbus to visit the Statehouse and the Ohio State Supreme Court. Seniors were able to participate in the Senior Class trip to Gettysburg, Williamsburg, Jamestown and Norfolk. They experienced places that we discussed in

American Government; moreover, they had cultural experiences of fine dining and a cruise. A cultural activity that was enjoyed by many was the trip to see the stage production of "Wicked" at Playhouse Square in Cleveland.

One of our extracurricular activities available to students is Youth 4 Youth. In addition to students volunteer their time in our community, they gave much support to Clearview during our tragic times this past year. At the end of the year, this group did a Reach Out presentation to our 8<sup>th</sup> graders. They advocated for treating each other kindly, acceptance and good deeds for our fellow humans. Their leadership was awesome and we are very proud of the upperclassman for putting together this 8<sup>th</sup> grade presentation.

The Scholastic Challenge team had a busy year. They participated in the Erie Shores Conference Fall competition, Patriot Conference Winter competition, the WEWS Channel 5's "It's Academic" and on WEOL's "Scholastic Games." The book club is an after school group that meets and has great discussion about books. With the help of Mrs. Cokain and the Clearview Education Foundation we were able to provide two books free for our students to keep. Also, The Lorain Public Library South Branch helped us get copies of the books to read which was a great assistance as we needed up to 35 books for each session

The CHS Choirs had a busy year. They participated in two fundraisers and two wonderful concerts. The chorale had some additional performances by sing at Mr. Ashford's Memory Tree Planting Service and singing at Graduation. Several students sang at the Lorain County Solo and Ensemble Contest and our students received two Superior ratings and two Excellent ratings.

The Clearview band continued to grow in numbers and quality this year that translated into excellent performances. In addition to Friday nights, they performed in three band shows, pep rallies and two basketball games. The concert band performed two wonderful concerts as well as a performance at the OMEA large group adjudicated event in March. Furthermore, the band marched in the Lorain Memorial Day parade and performed at our Commencement ceremony.

Students have the opportunity to join the Science Olympiad team. They competed at the Kenstone Invitational, the Mentor Invitational and the regional meet at LCCC.

## **Clearview Curriculum & Instruction**

Changes are on the way. Every ten years, or so, the State of Ohio tunes up its expectations for students and teachers. The 2014/2015 school year is the beginning of the latest version. New testing, new reporting, and new graduation requirements will create a new learning environment. As the world around us focuses more on technology, transportation, and communication - the demands of the workplace and the school become more complex and require additional training. The new benchmarks are being put into place to help ALL students become College & Career Ready.

Clearview staff has been organizing for this change for the last few years. We have been engaged in the Race to the Top initiative – planning, practicing, and pre-

paring based on two major curriculum revisions: The Common Core State Standards (CCSS) in Mathematics and English/Language Arts <u>and</u> the Ohio Developed Science and Social Studies Standards. These new benchmarks will be rolled out in a new assessment program under the leadership of PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and careers).

These new "PARCC" tests will be very different from the OAA (Ohio Achievement Assessments) and the OGT (Ohio Graduation Test). Not only will they be more rigorous – but they will also be given on computers (or other, similar, electronic devices). These new tests will ask higher level questions, will require more complex thinking, will provide faster results, and will be "Computer Adaptive" (each test will be a little different – with correct answers creating more difficult questions, until a student's level is determined). While PARCC is creating CCSS Math and ELA tests for a number of states, they are also working with the Ohio Department of Education to generate Ohio specific Science and Social Studies tests.

Grades 3-8 will all have Mathematics and ELA (Reading & Writing) tests, as well as Science tests at 5<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades and Social Studies tests at 4<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grades. High School Graduation will move from the OGT (our sophomores are the last group to take the OGT) toward End of Course/End of Year Exams - provided by PARCC electronically – in Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, English I, English II, English III, American Government, American History, Physical Science, and Biology. The results of these tests will comprise a percentage of the student's grade. This year's freshman class of 2018 will also be given a College Entrance Exam test (like the ACT or SAT) when they are juniors (11<sup>th</sup> grade). While all students may not have to pass all test, there will be a composite score requirement for graduation.

In order to prepare teachers and students for the End-of-Year testing, PARCC will also provide mid-year "formative" assessments to gauge student readiness and allow for remediation and intervention – so that more students will be successful on the actual test. While present testing allows for 2.5 hours (or more) of testing, the new PARCC tests may require as much as 4.0 hours on a single test. An 8<sup>th</sup> grader who now spends 7.5 – 9.0 hours testing during the assessment-window, will now be responsible for 12-13 hours of assessment (during a longer window), plus the mid-year formative assessments. Of course, the mid-year formative testing will do away with the need for any "practice testing" that we have been doing on our own for many years.

The tests will be graded faster and more efficiently - electronically. Guidance Counselors and Central Office staff will spend less time packing, unpacking, inventorying, labeling, etc. Shipping and handling time and costs will be limited. In addition, these tests will create a common core of assessment that should prepare Clearview students to compete and succeed beyond high school. As teachers, students, colleges, and the workplace become more familiar with the benchmarks and requirements of these new assessments - all will be capable of making more informed choices and plans. While teachers will still be creating lesson plans, and students will still be learning – the focus will be sharper and the results should be more valuable for our matriculating seniors.

#### **Clearview Athletic Boosters**

A new school year is upon us and our student athletes are looking forward to new challenges in their respective sports. Our facilities, equipment, and uniforms continue to be upgraded on a continual basis in order to help our student athletes remain competitive and have great experiences at the same time. These upgrades are, in large part, due to the amazing support of the Clearview Athletic Booster Club. ## It's a Hit!

The Accelerated Reader (AR) Reward Program had another successful year. Students read books that are within their reading range (ability level) and take quizzes on those books that they read. If they pass the quiz with an 85 % they will receive the point value for that book. The more challenging the book, the more points the book is worth in points. This allows the students to pick out books according genres or authors they really enjoy.

As a parent, you know that asking your child to sit down and read a book with all of the other distractions i.e. video games, t.v., Ipods etc. is not an easy task. The AR Rewards program is good motivator to get them to read. This year, students at Vincent took 74,049 quizzes and passed 70,437 of those quizzes. That is a 95% pass rate! With their success with taking the test they earn a prize a various point levels. I don't want to forget the prizes. During the 2013-2014 school year the students earned 3,402 prizes. All of that reading lead to the total word count of 128 million for the entire school!

The AR program has a direct link to our students overall success as a student and success when it comes to taking the state level tests. So, as they saying goes, "the proof is in the pudding" really applies to the AR reward program.

The students that earned the reward took part in relay races and games that involved water balloons, buckets of water, and teachers and parents cheering them on. "It was," and I quote a second grader "Awesome!"

In closing, I only highlighted a few of the great things that took place at Vincent last year. The students and teacher amazed me with their accomplishments that they made last year. But, please remember, educating a child is not just between a teacher and student. We need the support of parents to reinforce what is taking place at school. Simply setting a homework routine at home will assist in the student's success at school. # Vaccine requirement for 7<sup>th</sup> Grade Entry

The Ohio Department of Health has immunizations required for school attendance. Your child must have 1 booster dose of the Tetanus vaccine, Tdap, prior to entry into the 7<sup>th</sup> grade. Under Ohio Revised Code 3317.67, the school must have written proof of immunizations on file by the 14<sup>th</sup> day of school. Students without proof are subject to exclusion from school.

You may obtain this vaccine from your private physician or other community providers. The Lorain County General Health District offers walk-in clinics throughout the county; please visit <a href="www.loraincountyhealth.com">www.loraincountyhealth.com</a> or call for a complete schedule of Child Immunization Clinics. 

# **Clearview Schools Bus Rules/Regulations**

The following rules and regulations insure the safest, most enjoyable and efficient transportation for your children.

- 1. Students must be at bus stop on time. Students should be at the bus stop at least 5 minutes before bus arrives. Bus operates on a fixed schedule.
- 2. While waiting at the bus stop, students must wait on sidewalk, driveway, or as far off of traveled portion of the road as possible.
- 3. Students must wait in an orderly manner and wait until bus comes to complete stop before approaching the bus.
- 4. If it is necessary to cross street or roadway, students must wait until driver signals them to cross and cross the street or roadway 10-15 feet in front of the bus to ensure that the driver sees them.
- 5. Students must enter bus single file and be seated as quickly as possible.
- 6. Upon leaving bus; wait until the bus comes to a complete stop before standing to exit. Standing is not permitted on a moving bus.
- 7. Exit single file in an orderly manner and walk away from the bus
- 8. Upon leaving bus, if student must cross roadway, walk approximately 10-15 feet forward so the driver can see the student. Do not cross until driver signals you to do so.
- 9. The operator of any school bus shall be responsible for the order and conduct of the pupils transported.
- 10. The operator has the responsibility to assign seats and will be directed to do so as a matter of policy.
- 11. Pupils should obey promptly and willingly any reasonable directive of the driver.
- 12. Outside of ordinary conversation, classroom conduct is to be observed. Shouting, vulgar language or gestures are not permitted.
- 13. Pupils must remain seated with feet on the floor in front of them; not in the aisle or draped over the seat back. Students must sit facing forward while the bus is in motion as if they were wearing seatbelts.
- 14. Students may not board or depart from a bus at any other stop than that which has been properly authorized by school authorities.
- 15. Pupils will not extend hands, arms, heads or objects

from the bus windows at any time.

- 16. Pupils are not permitted to shout, or gesture to passing vehicles or pedestrians from the bus.
- 17. Students may adjust windows only when permitted to do so by the driver.
- 18. Pupils may not throw any object including trash or paper either from within or out of the bus while waiting for, riding, or after leaving the bus. A trash can is provided
- 19. Riders must stay out of the driver's seat and may not tamper with any operating equipment.
- 20. Students may not exit from the emergency door unless directed to do so by the driver.
- 21. Eating and drinking food and beverages on the bus is prohibited. Neither food nor liquids are permitted on the bus except in school lunch bags or lunch pails.
- 22. The use of tobacco, drugs or alcohol in any form shall not be permitted on the bus.
- 23. Animals, knives, matches, firearms including cap and water pistols, explosives, glass and other similar breakables, or any other items creating a safety hazard are not permitted on the bus. Necessary school books and backpacks are permitted. Other items are not permitted.
- 24. Students needing to ride any bus other than their regular assigned bus must give driver a note from their principal or parent.
- 25. Students desiring to take another student home with them who does not normally ride a particular bus must obtain prior permission from bus driver or authorization from their principal to assure the bus is not overloaded.
- 26. Absolute quiet is required at railroad crossings. The

driver will turn off all radios and illuminate the dome lights to alert students to be absolutely quiet.
