The Curriculum Perspective

During the opening meeting for the school year on August 20th lots of positive energy was shared. I certainly enjoyed the video Superintendent Davis showed of Rita **Pierson**. That was a very positive and very powerful message. Coming in new to the position of Director of Curriculum and Instruction I wanted to keep a simple focus for teachers; I understand there will be many initiatives and working with the building principals on the OIP process will be a significant initiative to the position. Regardless, teaching and learning is always at the core of operations. This will remain as the key focus. The following is a review of that simple focus and what was specifically discussed at our CLS district staff opening:

Relationships First

◆ Promote strategies to place priority on building positive relationships with students - identify families, likes, dislikes, learning traits, strengths, and weaknesses. Build Rapport.

Active, Engaged, and Innovative

- ♦ Identify and promote research based instructional strategies by continually sharing best practice and providing continual opportunities for professional development.
- ◆ Support and promote teachers in efforts to develop creative, active lesson plans to engage students in the learning process.
- ◆ Establish a PLN, Personal Learning Network. Collaborate, connect, and share with colleagues in Clearview Schools and around the world. Staff utilization of Twitter for their PLN.
- ♦ 21st Century Skills Creativity, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, and Communication. Prepare students for the world of tomorrow.

Student Growth

- ♦ Identify and analyze assessment data to ensure students are making significant growth.
- ♦ Identify and implement intervention strategies to assist students that are not making growth.

The Ohio Improvement Process

Clearview Local Schools has been involved in the state required Ohio Improvement Process for a number of years. Teachers and administrators have experience in the process and that work will continue for the 2018-2019 school year. What is it? OIP is a systems framework of collaborative team protocols to analyze data, research aligned improvement strategies, implement and monitor strategies, provide feedback to teams and determine effectiveness based on performance and implementation data (ODE 2018). Basically, this is a requirement for districts to work collaboratively to develop a focused plan for increased student academic achievement. As you are aware the OIP requires Teacher Based Teams, Building Leadership Teams, and a District Leadership Team. **Jennifer Jackson**-



Ausperk from State Support Team 2 will once again serve as our consultant for the OIP. If you review the ODE website regarding the process it appears very complicated. Lists are now available for all teachers to gain access to student 504 and IEP information. The information was recently emailed and is organized specifically for teacher access (VES coming this afternoon!). Why WEP Training?

This past week many teachers at Durling and the High School engaged in WEP training. **Mark Millar** from the Educational Service Center came to Clearview and worked with several staff regarding this gifted services initiative. All school districts in Ohio reporting services for gifted students must have on file a copy of a **Written Education Plan** (WEP) for each student served. Ohio Administrative Code outlines the specific points that must be included on the WEP. We are fortunate to have Mark as a resource for this state requirement. Training for Vincent will also soon take place; a date will be established. Also of note, all grade 2 and grade 5 students will take a gifted screening in early October. Materials for testing are being ordered. More details will go out to Durling and Vincent once the date draws closer. Questions? Just send an email.
