Clearview Secondary Math Professional Development Event Next Week!

Next week on Tuesday, **February 6th**, Clearview will have a team of math teachers grades 4-12 engaging in math professional development. The participants are listed below in the graphic. Improving student academic achievement in math is a district goal identified through the Ohio Improvement Process. Resources, initiatives, and programs have been focused on this goal for the past several years. PD is an important component. Our Clearview Math teachers grades 4-12 will participate in a day of collaboration, organization, and professional learning.

The event will take place at the Educational Service Center of Lorain County. It will be facilitated by ESC Math Specialist **Mallary Mancino**. In advance of the program, Mallary has provided a survey to the group and she has been reviewing our Clearview Renaissance STAR math scores from the initial benchmarking to the current midyear test mark. She will gear the training to fit the needs of our students and teachers. The activities presented will focus on math instruction and organization for grades 4-12 and in general will include:

- 1) Data: Interpretation and analysis
- 2) Curriculum: Mapping and vertical alignment
- 3) Lesson Design: Instructional strategy and lesson structure

Thank you in advance to our Clearview math teachers for your collaboration and participation. Your continued efforts for professional learning are greatly appreciated!

We will look to conduct similar PD days like this one for other curricular areas on a consistent basis so that such collaboration and articulation can occur for other groups as well.

Ohio State Testing Spring 2024 Preparation: Writing Rubrics

Each issue of the Curriculum Connection from now until Spring will contain a section on Ohio State Testing Preparation. I will include details about test scheduling, test preparation, and test background. In this issue I will share the writing rubrics used to score student writing submitted for OST. How are the writing portions scored? Writing rubrics exist for this purpose and can be reviewed for teacher and student preparation. What exists ...

- Two writing rubrics grades 3 through 5: Informative and Opinion.
- ♦ Two writing rubrics grades 6 through 12: Informative and Argumentative.

Each rubric describes the score point characteristics across three domains:

- 1) Purpose, Focus, and Organization;
- 2) Evidence and Elaboration; and
- 3) Conventions.

Within the rubric the expectations are identified; this is where teachers can see the OST expectations. The top score is a "4" and the rubric identifies what constitutes a 4, 3, 2, 1, and 0. An example is provided in the graphic of the Score of 4 for Grades 3–5 for Purpose, Focus, and Organization for Opinion writing. Ohio's State Test Holistic Opinion Writing Rubric Grades 3-5

Score 4

Purpose, Focus, and Organization

The response is exemplary and reflects original writing throughout that directly addresses the topic. It has a clearly stated opinion and is focused on the audience and purpose of the task. The organizational structure creates clarity and completeness.

The response includes most of the following:

- an opinion that is strongly maintained throughout,
- little, if any, loosely related material,
- a clearly evident organizational structure that includes a skillfully crafted introduction and conclusion, and
- a logical progression of ideas that reflects a skillful use of transitional strategies to move from one idea to another.



Instructional Strategies Review: Formative Assessment with Participation Cards

In each issue of the Connection I will review a particular instructional strategy: Formative Assessment with Participation Cards. The goal of formative assessment is to monitor student learning to provide ongoing feedback that can be used by teachers to improve their teaching. Is what I am teaching breaking through? A great strategy to use as assessment FOR learning is the use of Participation Cards. Participation cards are a set of colored index cards which have labels on them. I agree, I disagree, or I don't know how to respond. Teachers use the cards to assess students' understanding. It is a quick check for understanding that may be needed prior to moving on in a lesson. The cards can provide more info than a Thumbs Up or Thumps Down approach. The use of cards can also give students a voice. This can especially be true for students that may not feel confident speaking out in front of their peers. Check out the link below from Edutopia for more:

March 7th. Arrangements are being made for non-test takers to have a late arrival to accommodate this event for the junior class. In addition, CHS teachers will be required to take



Clearview Gear Up Grant Update!

Clearview is in the third year of a six year grant program, Gear Up. Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) is a federal program that provides competitive grants to districts to increase the number of low-income students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. Our student cohort is currently in grades 8 and 9. **Josiah Barnes** from College Now is our in-house Advisor. Here's an update:



- ♦ Creating exposure opportunities; Planned Spring Break College Tour to Tiffin University
- Supporting Cohorts through classroom workshops and individual advising.
- ♦ 73% of 9th graders have been seen in a classroom workshop; 90% of 8th graders have been seen in a classroom workshop
- ◆ Creation of a new resource for teachers to use: Career and College Clubs, covering topics such as careers, education, peer pressure, and more. It is available to all teachers and staff at Durling Middle School/Clearview High School to use at their discretion. (Designed for 7th − 12th grade). 
hard work it takes to plan and develop such lessons.

This past Monday I stopped in **Karrie Stafford's** grade 5 ELA class at DMS. Karrie was teaching a unit on opinion writing (check page 2 OST!). For the writing unit she conducted several activities. She conducts a daily grammar activity to strengthen the foundation for the kids' writing skills. Next, kids read an opinion writing example taken from Scholastic Magazine. This served as a model. Karrie also incorporated a Venn Diagram


activity where kids had to distinguish between Editing and Revising strategies. Taken from our TpT account, kids then used a graphic organizer for "check"

editing; an old bank check picture was actually used in the process! Students were allowed to choose their own writing topic; however, Karrie conducts a writing conference with every student to assess progress for all of their prewriting stages. Nice work!!

It was great to see a speech presentation assignment for English 10! Lurlene West along with Academic Coach Jenna Horton are preparing students to present an




Opinion/Argumentative speech to the class. On the day of my observation, Lurlene was teaching the kids about using proper sources as evidence. She showed two micro-learning videos from YouTube from a learning series called Crash Course. One of the videos covered the use of social media sources and the pitfalls that potentially can exist. Kids will



Another awesome ELA writing lesson, this time in grade 2! I made a visit to **Andrew Holland's** classroom this past week where the kids were learning interesting facts about penguins. Andrew was going through a slide presentation on the interactive TV. Penguins have the same mate for life. They have an interesting way to



feed their young. Etc. Kids were quite intrigued! Next, Andrew displayed a graphic organizer he modeled for pre-writing. It had a specific space for the



On Thursday I stepped into **Derrick Walter's** Biology class at CHS for a visit. Derrick was introducing a new unit on Protein Synthesis, an important EOC standard. Protein synthesis is the process by which cells make proteins. Derrick was using several strategies to teach the process. He first obtained a effective visual resource from our district TpT account. This





included downloadable slides that he used for direct instruction.

Students had both physical and digital copies of the slides available through Derrick's google classroom. Next, Derrick conducted an I Do; We Do; You Do strategy. Kids eventually will be able to conduct the protein synthesis calculation independently. Impressive lesson!!
