

Clearview District Leadership Team Meeting #3 Next Week

The Clearview District Leadership Team will conduct their third quarter meeting next week on Wednesday, **March 13th**. DLT members, listed to the right, are reminded to secure subs for your participation. The meeting will be held from 8:00am-3:00pm in the CHS media center. We will once again be joined by members of State Support Team 2 who provide added assistance and guidance. The DLT is responsible for the Ohio Improvement Process and oversees the work of each of the three Building Leadership Teams, BLTs, in the district. In turn, each BLT oversees the work of each of the Teacher Based Teams, TBTs, in their respective building. This breakdown is important to note for at this third quarter meeting each BLT will conduct four related tasks:

- 1. Assess and report building progress regarding the three district goals identified for continuous improvement: Literacy, Math, and School Climate.
- 2. Conduct a specific assessment of each of the TBTs in the building.
- 3. Assess and report progress on each BLTs' identified Key Initiatives for the 2023-24 school year.
- 4. Conduct a "Systems and Structures Analysis" regarding the committee work within each school building to ensure efficacy and to ensure that building needs are being addressed.

The DLT will also review Ohio State Test data and review logistics associated with our upcoming 2024 spring testing. Each building is unique regarding both test preparation and test administration. The proper organization and structure must be in place to ensure that students are provided the best test environment for optimal performance.

Clearview Teachers Pay Teachers Account Reminder

A very popular resource used among staff K-12 is our district Teachers Pay Teachers subscription. The open resources created by teachers for teachers provides many options to engage learners. However, please note that the subscription is <u>not</u> for unlimited downloads. Our annual subscription provides **3,750 downloads annually** which

equates to approximately **31 per teacher** per year. If teachers are going over their allotment then that will simply provide less opportunity for their colleagues. Numbers are monitored but this is a reminder regarding how the subscription works. Questions? Let me know.



Ohio State Testing Spring 2024 Preparation: Clearview OST Trend Data

Each issue of the Curriculum Connection from now until Spring will contain a section on Ohio State Testing Preparation. I will include details about test scheduling, test preparation, and test background. In this issue I am sharing Clearview's Ohio State Testing Trend data going back to 2016. The graphic below provides an example but the link below provides teachers with specifics regarding our district's overall prior performance. This data is often shared at DLT meetings. It should also be used by Teacher Based Teams to identify gaps and content analysis. Two specific charts show: 1) Color coded trend data with increasing scores highlighted in Green

and decreasing scores highlighted in Red; 2) Trend data color coded to follow classes of students and how a particular class of students performs year to year. Both can be analyzed to see where our students are improving or not improving. If students scores are dropping significantly in a particular grade and consistently highlighted in Red then further analysis should occur. State testing is one test on one day and does not define the student nor the teacher. However, the goal should be to prepare our students accordingly and provide students with skills to take on this challenge successfully.

Value Added Roster Verification Process for the 2023-24 School Year Value-added analysis measures the impact schools and teachers have on students' academic progress. Required for VA teachers listed to the right:

School Set-Up, March 19 - April 9: Principals gain access to verify the staff lists. Teacher Roster Verification, April 10 - April 30: Teachers gain access to verify their class rosters and claim instructional responsibility for the students they taught, including the months they taught them, and the percentage of instruction they provided each student. Principals monitor teacher completion.

Principal Review and Approval, May 1 - May 23: Principals review staff instructional responsibilities and alerts before giving final approval. To learn more about the value added process and our responsibilities for this mandate, use this link:

Instructional Strategies Review: Vocabulary Games That Build Content Knowledge

In each issue of the Connection I will review a particular instructional strategy: Vocabulary Games That Build Content Knowledge. Initiatives exist in Clearview K-12 to improve student vocabulary skills. Subject-specific vocabulary goes hand-in-hand with a deep and meaningful knowledge of content. Content vocabulary helps students to better understand a unit of study.

We have covered many strategies to teach vocabulary to help students retain content knowledge. Check out the article link below that provides 5 vocabulary games that require students to recall, describe, explain, listen, and verbalize subject-specific vocabulary. Plus, kids like games!! Games allow kids to "play" with the words. Competition through games can provide motivation and engagement. The games can be used at multiple grade levels with multiple content areas. The examples given in the article are for high school biology but can be applied to multiple grade levels and subjects. One such game is called Articulate, from the board game. It is a game like charades requiring physical movement and acting out words without verbal assistance. If you decide to play one of these vocabulary games let me know; I'd love to see it in action!!

past week where she was conducting a lesson on atoms. Chrissy found a resource on our district TpT account. It contained a slide presentation along with handouts for kids in the form of doodle notes. The resource uses a combination of text and art for note taking. Kids followed along with Mrs. Foster to



Miles led the discussion that also included his use of various studio equipment tools and digital techniques. Students asked questions as aspiring artists and were given great insight based on direct experience. Dustie Cooper teaches eighth grade ELA at DMS. This past week I stopped into her class for a lesson she was conducting on the novel *Prisoner B-3087* by Alan Grantz. The novel is based on the true story of Yanek Gruener, a young Jewish boy who is 10 years old when the Nazis invade his home city of Kraków,

Poland in September 1939. Students are reading about how Yanek is forced from one nightmarish concentration camp to another, with World War II taking place all around him. With the novel unit, Dustie not only

provides lessons on reading comprehension and literary elements but also lessons regarding world history. The novel contains elements of racism and antisemitism. During my visit Dustie led a novel scene discussion reviewing racism; students shared their thoughts on why such human elements existed in the novel and why it exists in modern times. Awesome lesson!!
