This past school year, the administrative team focused heavily on fostering the relationship between the Clearview community and the high school by establishing numerous building activities designed to bring the staff/administration and parents together around traditional holiday events.

However, there is no greater importance than the lifelong lessons and growth that our student athletes take from their involvement and experiences during their involvement in athletics. Our student athletes, coaches, fans, and parents are all a big part of creating an environment that enhances these experiences. Therefore, we all must do our best to ensure that these opportunities to learn and develop are taken seriously. As parents, our role is critical to help support the growth of our children. The Positive Coaching Alliance does a great job of explaining this important task in the article below.

The Second-Goal Parent

PCA's mission is to make high school and youth sports a Development Zone to develop Better Athletes, Better People. Parents have an especially important role to play as a Second-Goal Parent who helps their child become a Triple-Impact Competitor who makes self, teammates and the game better.

A Second-Goal Parent recognizes that there is a Little Picture and a Big Picture in youth sports. The Little Picture concerns things like whether the child is playing the right position, the team is winning, etc. The Big Picture, which often gets drowned out by the Little Pictures, is about what the child is learning from youth sports.

There are two broad goals in youth sports: striving to win and building character so kids develop into successful, contributing members of society. As important as winning may seem, Second-Goal Parents let coaches and athletes worry about the first goal of scoreboard results. Second-Goal Parents have a much more important role to play: ensuring their children take away from sports lessons that will help them be successful in life. That is the Big Picture.

Keeping your focus on the Big Picture is much more vital than being an extraneous back-seat coach. The lifelong impact you can have – that no one else can in quite the way you can – is with the life lessons your child takes away from their sports experience. No one can be there for your child in this way better than you. No one.

If you embrace your role as a Second-Goal Parent, it will transform the way you see youth sports. It will help you seize the endless procession of teachable moments that will come your way again and again when you are looking for them.

What might have seemed like a disappointing loss or a failure by your child becomes an opportunity to reinforce resiliency. A tough competition in forbiddingly hot, cold, or nasty weather can prompt a conversation with your child about learning to enjoy challenges. Whether your child succeeds or fails on the playing field, you will be able to use the experiences to reinforce the kind of person you want him or her to be. A Second-Goal Parent focuses relentlessly on the Big Picture – helping their child take away the lessons that will help them be successful, contributing members of society. And, in the process a Second-Goal Parent is able to better enjoy their child's youth sports experience, which will end all too quickly.

Vaccine requirement for 7th and 12th Grade Entry

The Ohio Department of Health has new immunizations required for school attendance. Your child must have 1 booster dose of the Tetanus vaccine, Tdap, prior to entry into the 7th grade. Under Ohio Revised Code 3317.67, the school must have written proof of immunizations on file by August 17th. Students without proof are subject to exclusion from school.

The newest immunization is for ALL students entering 12th grade. Students entering 12th grade are required to receive a second dose of meningococcal vaccine unless their first dose was received after age 16, in which case only one dose is required. Students without proof are subject to exclusion from school.

You may obtain this vaccine from your private physician or other community providers. The Lorain County General Health District offers walk-in clinics throughout the county; please visit www.loraincountyhealth.com or call for a complete schedule of Child Immunization Clinics.

CHS Student Council had a very active year! We grew to over 40 members this year which more than tripled the size from the previous year. Elections were held at the beginning of the year and officers included: Kyle Rosser, President; Maiya Lebron, Vice President; Jessica Schrenkel, Secretary; and Julian Colbert, Treasurer. We introduced a Twitter account as well as the Remind app to communicate electronically with CHS students. Student Council held one bake sale during the first parent/teacher conferences and later assisted the wrestling team with another one. Two successful blood drives not only collected much needed blood for our community, but also helped raise \$1000 in scholarship money, which was presented to Senior and our president, Kyle Rosser, During Homecoming, Student Council held Spirit Week, which included hallway decorating as well as other competitions. The sophomore class won the hallway decorating contest. Calculated through a point system awarded for participation throughout Spirit Week, Student Council awarded a new Spirit Trophy to the class with the most school spirit. This year sophomores and seniors tied for the most spirited. Student Council also helped to organize the first Halloween Walk for the community. We organized hallway decorating to help decorate for the walk, and sophomores won the hallway decorating contest as well as the Halloween costume contest. In November, Student Council organized the annual Thanksgiving Food Drive for our families in need in our district. In addition to collecting food, monetary donations were also collected. We held a "Count Day" in which pennies were collected each period and had to be counted by teachers before class could begin. That helped raise our money collected so that this year we were able to donate a record 43 Thanksgiving meals to families. CBI

Career Based Intervention is designed to give students the opportunity to complete their education while exploring the obligations of the world of work. They have the ability to earn elective credits for work-based learning either paid or unpaid, depending on the grade level. During this school year CBI students had the opportunity to participate in several activities in addition to the daily curriculum. Seniors were able to participate in the senior class trip to Gettysburg, Williamsburg, Jamestown and Norfolk. For many, this was an opportunity that they would otherwise not have. In addition to historical sites, they also visited the Battleship Wisconsin, enjoyed a visit to Virginia Beach, and a dinner cruise. Students participated in the Lorain County Metroparks Holiday Lights at Carlisle again this year. The juniors chose to use the theme "Little Drummer Boy" and the seniors chose "The Nightmare before Christmas." Students built the scenes, travelled to the park to set up the display, and then returned after the holiday to tear it down. In December we took a trip to Columbus to visit the Statehouse and the Ohio State Supreme Court. Students had guided tours drawing attention to the art, architecture, and current uses of both buildings. They were also met by the current state representatives and senator for our district. In addition, students worked in job stations outside the school day which include fast food (Burger King, Arby's, McDonald's), retail (Conrad's, Rue 21, Marc's), Pierre Foods, automotive (D&J Automotive) and pizza (Little Caesar's). Some worked within the school helping maintenance while others worked in the high school cafeteria

Violations of this policy will result in the phones/
devices being confiscated and turned into the office.
The first Offense will allow students to claim their
phones from the office at the end of the day.
Subsequent offenses will require parent pick up of
the device and may result in progressive discipline
including detention, Tues/Thurs school and
suspension.

DMS End of Year Highlights

6th Grade Reading, Mrs. Koehn

This year in Reading we worked hard on becoming strong readers and writers. Our students worked diligently on their reading skills, getting sharper with their comprehension skills and strategies. We increased our vocabulary by defining and learning new words from daily activities, as well as from the novels read in class. This year our students read *Shiloh*, *James and the Giant Peach, Tuck Everlasting, Bridge to Terabithia* and *Where the Red Fern Grows*. These books were enjoyable reads for the students, but I think that *Where the Red Fern Grows* took first place with the sixth graders, as a favorite!

Again, technology took a strong role in their curriculum this year by implementing Study Island for several subjects, Accelerated Reading and Math and Brain Pop with classroom lessons. Students use the Smart Boards daily, Chrome books when writing, and student computers as a resource when needed for class. Using technology with lessons build skill, interest and enthusiasm for learning.

Students worked daily to prepare for the sixth grade State test, reviewing and implementing materials and skills to master their core areas with an abundance of nonfiction. The students read about a tigress and her cubs, and then we were able to meet one of those very cubs later in the year on our zoo fieldtrip!

For fun this year, we traveled to the Cleveland Zoo where we had fun visiting all the animals and the Rainforest! We participated in Field Day and made our own amazingly colorful tie dye shirts!

I am very proud of how hard our students worked throughout the year! It was so great to always see them with a book and to be so interested in reading for fun! As a whole, we also became stronger readers and writers. This was a really great group of kids that have grown before my eyes and are ready for Middle School! Thanks to them, it was another great year. in Sixth Grade!

7th Grade Reading ~ Mrs. Foster

This year in seventh grade reading, the students worked very hard. We read the books, The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton, A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens, The Devil's Arithmetic by Jane Yolen and Hatchet by Gary Paulsen. While we read The Devil's Arithmetic, the students researched the Holocaust that occurred in Germany during WWII. We also discussed gangs and bullying while we read The Outsiders, allowing the students to become aware of the unjust actions and ideals that can exist when in the wrong hands. In turn, the students became more openminded to the many differences that humans exhibit and hopefully learned to embrace those differences.

The same teachers of the seventh grade team tried a new approach to notes and lesson delivery with interactive notebooks. These notebooks incorporate visual, auditory

and kinesthetic learning styles. The students enjoyed the new approach to learning and were able to file much more knowledge into their long-term memories. Interactive notebooking is here to stay in seventh grade reading.

7th Grade Science, Mrs. Southard

The 7th grade science students were involved in a variety of lessons that helped to tap into individual skills and strategies to address the 21st Century learner. To support this, the students were afforded an opportunity to participate in The Ohio Energy Project, which granted Mrs. Southard's classroom with \$2500 worth of supplies and materials. Because of the Ohio Energy Project students were able to become energy leaders by applying skills to teach others about energy efficiency, help to save money and energy at home and at school, understand how to use energy saving devices, make more efficient choices, and share energy saving materials with their families. I am so thankful for opportunities like those mentioned above as it is a testament to the continued support of others in the education of our students. When students take what they learn and share that knowledge with others outside of the classroom then the lessons becomes more meaningful.

In addition to hands-on related activities, the students were engaged in an extensive frog dissection unit. Studies included learning how the organism functions, its body processes, and how frogs contribute to the ecosystem.

We even extended lessons that incorporated cross-curricular lessons by attending programs at the Cleveland Rock Hall of Fame Museum. The students were able to learn about how music influences issues that are socially and politically related and how people's opinions could be shaped by musical media. In short, the 7th grade classes were filled with a plethora of activities designed to allow the students explore new ways of thinking.

8th Grade Social Studies, Mr. Christensen

The 2015/2016 school year was a great year. This year in social studies we did several fantastic projects. The students had several opportunities to show their creative sides and express their interests. One of my favorite things that we did this year included the black history projects. The students had an opportunity during black history month to research a notable African American. They were allowed to choose from several categories such as entertainers, musicians, activists, educators, etc. Their projects included bringing in food, artwork, music, video clips, and more. Students presented their research and got the opportunity to explain why they chose a particular person. The classes really enjoyed the presentations. The Philadelphia trip was a fun and educational way to close out the year. Students were able to learn the history of Philadelphia while enjoying some fabulous sightseeing. The trip was really a great way for students and teachers to bond and get to know each other. Philadelphia is a great city to visit!

8th Grade Reading, Mr. Collier

Each 8th grader in Mr. Collier's Reading class completed a Passion Project this year. Students researched and developed projects in areas they were most passionate about. Projects included creating music, writing original material, creating apps, video games, websites and YouTube channels. Other students designed clothing, homes, furniture or uniforms. Some students completed artwork, photo portfolios and established their own businesses. Some students chose to complete service projects as part of their Passion Projects. Ariel Weese & Alicia Burnsworth organized a Stuffed Animal Drive before the holidays. They collected over 700 stuffed animals to deliver to children in hospitals, day cares, and animal shelters. Ariel & Alicia held a fundraiser this spring. Students donated money to duct tape Mr. Majoras to the wall. These two donated the proceeds (\$100) to the Alzheimer's Association in Avon. Ariannah Christarella and Kaylee Wright volunteered weekly at Weslevan Village Senior Living Home. Sierra Hitchens created a Family Cookbook and prepared her grandmother's cheesecake. Robert McCardle did a cooking demonstration for the class and made his world famous chocolate chip pancakes. Madelyn Mazurek and Aurora Glass created a movie trailer titled "Horror School" and used students and our school to complete. Nelia Holley wrote, produced and starred in her own music video. Sage Swiney and Tahi Alkassem developed a gaming app that may be available for download by this summer.

There were many other outstanding, creative projects completed this year. Through this assignment, students improved research, editing, technology and presentation techniques. They were required to plan and develop a plan to turn their passion into a career.

Better Speech and Hearing Month

The American Speech-Language Hearing Association dedicates the month of May to raising communication awareness. On May 17, 2016, Mr. Krase's classroom at Durling Middle School made individual pledges about becoming better communicators. Examples of these pledges included, "using acceptable words when speaking to adults" and "listening more closely to people when they are talking." The students began by brainstorming ideas about what skills it takes to be excellent communicators. This activity was a great way for students to reflect about their own communication practices. So let's celebrate
