The first day of our 2021-2022 school year will begin on August 18th. 



HAPPY FALL!!!

We are really looking forward to what we hope will be a relatively normal school year. It has been a while since we have gotten to see ALL of our students but we are looking forward to full classrooms and busy hallways again! We hope that everyone took the summer to rest and spend time away from screens and computers!

We know that everyone is anxious to get back into classrooms with their friends and teachers and much more direct instruction! We have a plan for learning this fall that will hopefully allow everyone the chance to get caught up on some of the concepts and ideas that they missed out on last school year. We have hired 4 additional academic coaches this fall who will be working with each of our grade levels to provide interventions and small group instruction to ensure students are catching up on instruction they may have missed during the 20-21 school year. While we plan to continue to use the skills and programs that our students were introduced to in the last year and a half, this year we are able to increase student access by allowing them the use of a chromebook in every classroom. We know that our teachers and hopefully students are looking forward to interacting with their colleagues and classmates.

We will have a few changes in our bell schedule this year with students seeing some differences in the amount of time between classes depending on the time of day. We are limiting the use of student lockers by allowing students to carry bookbags to class IF the bookbags are CLEAR. Students will have access to lockers at the beginning of the day, lunch and then again prior to 8th period. Students will not be allowed to go to their lockers before dismissal, they will already have their belongings to leave prior to their final class. Clear bookbags are easily ordered from Amazon and Walmart or will be available to purchase from Durling PTO this fall. Students will NOT be permitted to carry opaque bookbags from class to class.

As we start our school year we are hoping for a return to "normal" as we plan for activities, clubs, sports, and programs. We will continue to follow safety precautions to make sure that everyone in the building stays safe and healthy while we open up these activities.

This year, more than ever, it is crucial that we partner with our families to work together to help our students get back on track with their learning. We will be changing the date of our FALL OPEN HOUSE from August 19th at 3:30 pm to AUGUST 16th from 3:30-5:00. This will allow us to meet with everyone before school begins so that parents have the chance to meet their child's teachers and get a head start on opening up the lines of communication. We will offer NEW STUDENT ORIENTATION meetings at 3:30 and then again at 4:15 in the cafeteria on August 16th for ALL new students regardless of grade level.

Each school year is a new beginning and this year more than ever we are looking forward to the new year! A chance to see ALL of our students again! We are looking forward to a great year of working together to move our students in a positive direction educationally, emotionally, and socially! Please take the time to look over the student handbook with your student paying close attention to our Dress Code, Phone Policy and Attendance Policy. Welcome Back CHS 2021-2022!

So, is everybody ready to come back? We at the high school certainly hope so. The teachers and staff have been anxiously waiting for a return to some semblance of normalcy for 16 months, and can't wait to have all of you back into the building. We have missed you!

What will the new "normal" look like? While having students and teachers back in the halls and classes everyday is "back to normal," our methods for teaching, learning, and navigating the day will be different from what many are envisioning. Let me just stress that the "new normal" will be an increase in educational efficiency (which will be a modern blend of traditional and digital learning) building efficiency, (faster transit time between classes) as well as some modern updates to the building code of conduct and expectations.

Educational Efficiency- All high school students will be receiving a laptop at the beginning of the year, which will remain assigned to them throughout their high school career. The laptops will be replacing traditional text distribution (in most classes) and can be taken home for consistent and reliable assignment completion and online class participation. Students will be expected to have their laptop in their possession each school day. Because students will have laptops on their person throughout the day, backpacks are permissible into classrooms. The laptops also make it easier for students to be better prepared for class by cutting down on "traditional" school supplies, which very often become lost, forgotten or never purchased in the first place.

Hallway Efficiency- With the addition of a 1:1 student to computer ratio, and continued efforts at maintaining a healthy environment, lockers WILL NOT be assigned this year. By removing locker usage, the building saw a dramatic decrease in class tardiness, restroom delays, and counterproductive student socialization during class changes.

Dress Code Update- While the expectation of students wearing clean, maintained and socially appropriate clothing has not changed, a couple of alterations have been approved to "keep up with the times".

- 1) Students ARE permitted to wear jeans with holes or shreds. However, students ARE NOT permitted to have giant holes or rips from the thigh up. Jeans which are slashed and torn above the thigh may be worn with leggings underneath.
- 2) Leggings are permitted so long as tops are FINGERTIP LENGTH.
- 3) Shorts are permitted so long as they are FINGERTIP LENGTH.
- 4) Skirts must be FINGERTIP LENGTH.
- 5) Belly shirts are NOT PERMITTED.
- 6) Head covering such as ball caps, hoods, skull caps and dew rags ARE NOT PERMITTED.
- 7) Jeans must fit at the waist. NO SAGGING!

So, it's pretty easy. No head coverings (unless special circumstances are approved) and keep everything fingertip length. If violations do occur, parents will be called to bring a change of clothes and detentions may be assigned.


Let's Keep It Classy Clearview!

If a staff member has to ask a student to put personal technology away, they will be given the chance to correct the action. If a student has to be warned twice, an office referral will often be the next step. School administrators DO have the option to remove and hold onto personal technology if a student is abusing the privilege. Personal technology is also the sole responsibility of the student. The schools CAN NOT guarantee the safety or security of personal devices so please use good judgement when considering bringing outside technology into the building.

As the Director of Curriculum and Instruction I am looking forward to a new school year filled with active, engaged, and innovative learning experiences for all Clearview students. Clearview plans to return to traditional in-person learning for all students K-12. We are excited to safely return to our classrooms for student learning for the 2021-2022 school year! Our goal is to create a successful learning environment where all students feel valued. The Clearview theme is "Relationships First." We believe strongly that "no significant learning can take place without a significant relationship." We will continue to place priority on building a rapport with students and establishing a classroom environment that is welcoming, caring, safe, supportive, and fun for all students!

The Clearview Curriculum and Instruction Focus

The basis for our curricular work contains three main areas of focus. First, we strive to establish strong relationships and rapport with our students. Second, we strive to identify instructional best practices to make learning active, engaged, innovative, and fun. News regarding district initiatives and academic programs will be shared. Information regarding dates and times of these meetings will be shared at the start of the 2021-2022 school year.

Key District Initiatives 2021-2022

During the time of the pandemic our students and staff were forced to engage in online learning. Now that we are returning to traditional in-person instruction we will continue to apply all that has been learned and gained from our online learning experience. We have grown stronger as a result. Important initiatives have been established and developed in this regard in an effort to best support students as they return to school. The following list contains just a few of the district's key curricular initiatives moving forward:






- 1. <u>Google Classroom:</u> All Clearview teachers K-12 will continue to utilize an online learning portal as an extension of their traditional classroom. Google Classroom will be utilized by Clearview teachers K-12 where class communication, information, and documents can be attained online. I encourage all Clearview parents/guardians to also engage with your child's Google Classroom portal to share in this extension of classroom information. The district will look to provide parent training for Google Classroom; look for this to take place during the school year in an effort to support families with this initiative.
- 2. 1:1 Computer to Student Ratio: Clearview's computer inventory significantly increased over the last 2 years. When students return to school for the 2021-2022 school year every classroom K-8 will be equipped with a laptop cart for every student to engage in digital learning activity. Also, each student at Clearview High School will be assigned an individual laptop at the beginning of the school year for digital learning to be used at school and home. Handbooks that outline laptop usage and expectations will be shared with students and families at the beginning of the school year. Parent and student signatures will be required to ensure this important info is attained. We are excited for our students to be able to utilize technology for their daily learning activity!
- 3. Academic Coaches: Starting in the 2021-2022 school year a total of twelve Academic Coaches, four per school building, will join the Clearview staff. Academic Coaches are all properly licensed teachers that have been hired by Clearview Schools though the Educational Service Center of Lorain County for the purpose of providing additional learning support and intervention for students. The goal of this initiative is to provide one-on-one, small group, and whole group academic tutoring for students K-12. Each building will utilize and schedule our Academic Coaches in a manner that best meets the needs of the students and school accordingly.
- 4. Extended Learning: This past summer Clearview provided a summer extended learning program for all students K-12. Students K-8 were able to participate in a 10-day program in June titled Summer Academic Enrichment Camp. Extended learning activity focused on improving Reading and Math skills. Students at Clearview High School were able to participate in a program titled Summer Credit Recovery. Students were able to recover lost course credits and apply them toward high school graduation. This was conducted through online courseware. CHS teachers monitored and assisted. Both of these Extended Learning programs are scheduled to continue next summer.

- 5. Added Curricular Resources: Curricular resources and programs have significantly increased over the past two years. Many new programs have been attained including Open Court ELA for students K-2; Wonders ELA for students grades 3-6; Savvas ELA for students 9-12; IXL Math for students grades 5-12; Gallopade Social Studies for grades 4-8; and many more. In addition, continued use of digital instructional programs such as Freckle, Flocabulary, Edpuzzle, Brain Pop, Mystery Science, and Discovery Education will continue to be important learning resources that connect to our new 1:1 computer to student ratio. People not Programs Make the Difference! Therefore, Clearview teachers continue to work diligently to train in these programs and train to continually improve instructional strategies.
- 6. **Zones of Regulation:** Student Social Emotional Learning, SEL, continues to be an important element of the overall learning experience for students in Clearview K-12. State initiatives require that school districts address SEL for student mental health and wellness. For this purpose, Clearview utilizes the Zones of Regulation. The Zones seeks to teach students self-regulation strategies by understanding characteristics and triggers of one's own emotions.
